Kenya nominates candidate for Secretary General of the Commonwealth



On August 31, 2021 Foreign Affairs, Cabinet Secretary Amb. Raychelle Omamo convened a Diplomatic Briefing of High Commissioners and Senior Officials of the diplomatic missions from Commonwealth Member State to introduce Defence Cabinet Secretary Amb. Dr. Monica Juma as Kenya's nominee for Secretary General of the Commonwealth.

This followed her nomination by His Excellency Uhuru Kenyatta, President of the Republic of Kenya on August 30, 2021 to the post of the Secretary General of Commonwealth.

Speaking at the diplomatic briefing, CS Omamo reiterated Kenya's commitment at various international foras.

"As a country we believe in the purpose of multilateralism and stand in solidarity with countries from all regions as we collectively build our world of tomorrow," CS Omamo said.

The Cabinet Secretary underscored that, the validity of multilateralism is now more than ever vindicated. "As a member of the UNSC, the African Union, the East African Community and the Commonwealth, Kenya will not relent in contributing its fair share of its obligation at regional and international levels."

CS Amb Raychelle Omamo addresses High Commissioners and Senior officials of Commonwealth Member States to introduce CS Defence Amb. Dr. Monica Juma, Kenya's nominee for Secretary General of the Commonwealth on August 31, 2021.

The CS stressed that, Dr. Juma was an absolute topnotch candidate as a diplomat of vast experience; an administrator of peace and security at the regional, international level; a crafter of Foreign Policy and diplomatic engagement; a consensus builder and an exemplar of the commonwealth values.

Kenya believes in the strong bonds of the Commonwealth founded on common heritage and aspiration for a collective future with shared prosperity, the CS highlighted. She added that, the core values and principles of the commonwealth; democracy, rule of law and human rights underline Kenya's constitution and therefore influence the value system and national psyche of our people.

CS Omamo reiterated President Kenyatta's request to every commonwealth member state for support and endorsement.

"I am confident, that Dr. Juma will deliver well on this big promise. We therefore seek your favourable consideration of Amb. Dr. Monica Juma as the 7th Secretary General of the Commonwealth.

Amb. Juma addressed the Diplomats and shared her vision for the Commonwealth Secretariat. She underscored her commitment to build strong secretariat; forge stronger connections among member state; and nurture consensus in order to deliver on the Commonwealth mandate.





Angola's Foreign Minister makes maiden visit to Kenya



H.E. Amb. Téte António, Minister for External Relations of the Republic of Angola was received by Amb. Josphat Kaunda Maikara Kenya's Ambassador to Angola on arrival at the Jomo Kenyatta International Airport on August 19, 2021.

On August 19, 2021, H.E Amb. Téte António, Minister for External Relations of the Republic of Angola made a one-day official visit to Kenya and delivered a written message from H.E. João Manuel Gonçalves Lourenço, President of the Republic of Angola to H.E. President Uhuru Kenyatta.

Cabinet Secretary Amb. Raychelle Omamo, hosted H.E Amb. Téte António, and noted with appreciation the historical visit, the first official visit to Kenya by a Minister for External Relations of the Republic of Angola.

The two ministers held extensive bilateral discussions, during which they reiterated the significance of the exchange of high-level visits in unlocking the latent value of bilateral cooperation.

They discussed the acceleration of the launch of the Kenya-Angola Joint Commission for Cooperation, tentatively scheduled in December 2021 in Nairobi and the consolidation of peace and stability in the Horn of Africa and the Great Lakes Region in line with the African Union 2063 Agenda of the Silencing of Guns.

H.E. Amb. Tete Antonio conveyed H.E President Lourenco's appreciation regarding H.E President Kenyatta's stewardship of the Organization of African, Caribbean and Pacific States (OACPS).

Amb. Raychelle Omamo lauded Angola for its leadership of the International Conference on the Great Lakes Region and for spearheading the peace process in the Central African Republic.

The Angolan delegation appreciated Kenya's support, and important contributions to the A3+1 in supporting the ICGLR position on the Central African Republic and in advancing the African Agenda at the UNSC.

The two Ministers committed to work together to ensure regular bilateral consultations at all levels and explored ways to accelerate the launch of the Kenya-Angola Joint Commission for Cooperation.

Kenya and Colombia sign bilateral instruments



Kenya and Colombia signed two significant Memorandums of Understanding, a testament of the importance the two countries attach to the relations between them.

The instruments signed by Amb. Raychelle Omamo, Kenya's Foreign Minister and H.E. Marta Lucia Ramirez, Vice President and Minister for Foreign Affairs of Colombia included; MOU on Political Consultations and MOU between Kenya's Foreign Service Academy and the Diplomatic Academy of Colombia.

Speaking during the signing ceremony held virtually on August 20, 2021, CS Omamo noted that the agreement will open up new channels of bilateral and multilateral cooperation between the two countries and deepen relations and cooperation in areas of agriculture; peace and security; environment, climate change, education, tourism and cultures.

The Cabinet Secretary proposed reactivation of the existing bilateral instrument in the area of trade and investment so as to build robustness in economic relations. She encouraged business people to engage and explore business opportunities in the two countries.

The CS appreciated Republic of Colombia's support during Kenya's bid for UNSC for the period 2021-2022 saying that Kenya will use the position to enhance global peace and security while strengthening south to south cooperation which is critical for socio-economic transformation of developing countries.

H.E. Marta Lucia on behalf of the Republic of Columbia conveyed support in the fight against the spread of the Covid-19 pandemic saying it will facilitate increase of production and distribution of Covid – 19 vaccines in Africa.

Earlier on, Colombia's Ambassador to Kenya H.E. Monica de Grief Lando called on CS Amb. Raychelle Omamo where they reviewed bilateral relations between Kenya and Colombia and noted potential areas to enhance cooperation.

Kenya and Colombia continue to enjoy vibrant and strong diplomatic ties buttressed by a friendship that has been in existence for 46 years.

Kenya, Tanzania hold 4th session of JCC

The 4th Session of the Joint Commission for Cooperation (JCC) between the Republic of Kenya and the United Republic of Tanzania was held in Nairobi from August 19 - 20, 2021. The session was convened as a follow up to the successful maiden visit by Her Excellency Samia Suluhu Hassan, President of the United Republic of Tanzania to the Republic of Kenya on May 4 -5, 2021.

To strengthen and enhance cooperation between the two countries, Kenya and Tanzania signed the following Memoranda of Understanding - MoU on Political and Diplomatic Consultations; MoU on Higher Education, Scientific and Technology Co-operation; MoU on Higher Education, Scientific and Technology Co-operation; MoU on Higher Education, Scientific and Technology Co-operation; MoU on Reaffirmation and Demarcation of the International Boundary.

The Kenyan delegation was led by Amb. Raychelle Omamo Cabinet Secretary of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Republic of Kenya. The Tanzanian delegation was led by her Tanzanian counterpart, Hon. Amb. Liberata R. Mulamula (MP) from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and East African Cooperation.



The JCC provided a platform to strengthen bilateral relations between Kenya and Tanzania. Deliberations during the JCC were undertaken, cognizant of the existing areas of cooperation between the two countries in the political, defence, security, economic, social and cultural spheres.



On trade, the JCC took note of the progress made by the Joint Trade Committee in addressing most of the challenges facing bilateral relations and urged the resolution of the remaining issues.

On health matters, the Ministers took note of the meeting of the Health Ministers held in Nairobi that resolved to put in place a joint mechanism for dealing with COVID-19 including testing and vaccine roll out. Further it was agreed to set up modalities for exchange of health personnel.

On immigration and labour, the JCC took note of the Joint Technical Committee meeting of Immigration Chiefs and Labour officials to discuss immigration and labour matters held on 5th August 2021.

The JCC emphasized on the importance of regular interaction at the highest level to review progress and iron out any issues. It was agreed that the JCC will be held more regulary.

The 4th Session of the JCC was organized at three levels namely: The Ministerial Segment, Principal Secretary's Meeting and Senior Officials Meeting. It brought together Cabinet Secretaries and Ministers, Principal and Permanent Secretaries, Diplomats and Senior Public Officials from Government Ministries, Departments and State Agencies of the two countries.

Following the State Visit to Kenya in May 2021 by Her Excellency Samia Suluhu Hassan where two Memorandums of Understanding on Joint Technical Commission meetings were signed, the two East African nations continue to work together for the mutual benefit of their people.

On August 20, 2021, technical experts from Kenya and Tanzania held the fourth session of the Kenya-Tanzania, Joint Commission for Cooperation (JCC) in Nairobi with the official opening ceremony of the meeting of experts presided over by CAS Hon. Ababu Namwamba.

The bilateral discussions during the JCC were aimed at strengthening the mutually beneficial relations for the benefit of Kenya and Tanzania.

Speaking during the ceremony, CAS Hon. Ababu Namwamba applauded the Technical Experts from both countries for their hard work and dedication in preparation of the JCC noting that, discussions will advance the fraternal ties existing between Kenya and Tanzania and enhance the common values and aspiration for a better life of the citizens.

He encouraged the experts to exhaustively negotiate on three clusters under discussion namely; Foreign Affairs and Security; Economic Affairs and Cultural Issues with a view to review and finalize all instruments of cooperation and chart new areas of cooperation.

The fourth session of the JCC sought to review the status of implementation of decisions and recommendation of the 3rd session of the JCC, the status of existing MOUs and considered new areas of cooperation between Kenya and Tanzania.

Kenya, South Africa launch JCC

Kenya and South Africa held the inaugural session and official launch of the Kenya- South Africa Joint Commission for Cooperation (JCC) on August 11, 2021 in Nairobi.

Cabinet Secretary Amb. Raychelle Omamo together with her South Africa counterpart Dr. Naledi Pandor, chaired the Inaugural Session of the Kenya-South Africa Joint Commission for Cooperation. They reaffirmed the close friendship, common interests and values that are the foundation of the strong relationship between the two countries.

The two Foreign Ministers held bilateral talks where they reviewed the status of bilateral relations between Kenya and South Africa and exchanged views on regional and continental development and multilateral cooperation. Further, they emphasized the need to continue working jointly towards enhancing political, economic and defence cooperation and welcomed negotiations of Agreements and Memorandum of Understanding under six areas of mutual interest including-Correctional services; political consultations; migration; terrorism; diplomatic training.

Other possible areas of cooperation and collaboration discussed included – trade and investment; agriculture; livestock and fisheries; education and human resource development; art, culture and sports; defence and police matters; health; science and technology, energy, maritime and air transport; housing and infrastructure development with the Lamu Port, South Sudan Ethiopia (Lapset Corridors)

The two leaders hailed and encouraged cooperation and coordination between the three African – non-permanent members (A3) of the UNSC as they advance the African Agenda in the Security Council.



On Women, Peace and Security Agenda, the two ministers noted progress made in the implementation of the United Nations Resolution 1325 and committed to support each other's initiatives in advancing this agenda.

On the margins of the JCC between Kenya and South Africa, President Uhuru Kenyatta held a virtual bilateral meeting with Dr. Naledi Pandor, South African Foreign Minister where they discussed matters of mutual interest between the two countries.

The holding of the inaugural session of the JCC was reflective of the commitment by the Heads of State of the two countries who have indicated their desire to elevate the relations to higher levels.

On August 20, 2021, Foreign Affairs Principal Secretary, Amb. Macharia Kamau and the Deputy Director General, South African Department for International Relations and Cooperation opened the Senior Officials Meeting (SOM) of the inaugural session of the Kenya-South Africa Joint Commission for Cooperation(JCC) that was followed by the Ministerial segment.

They lauded the JCC as an opportunity for Kenya and South Africa to robustly engage in advancing the common African agenda of pursuing economic prosperity in the spirit of pan-Africanism and progressive liberal democracy. The two leaders reiterated the urgency of defending the Afro-centrist values in shaping the trajectory of African people.

This year's International Youth Day, was celebrated globally on August 12, 2021, and the Ministry of Foreign Affairs Kenya was not left behind. Chief Administrative Secretary, Hon. Ababu Namwamba presided over the virtual International Youth Day celebrations with the Ministry Staff from headquarters and 56 missions abroad in attendance.

The event themed; "Transforming Food Systems: Youth Innovation for Human and Planetary Health" aimed at underscoring the fact that healthy lifestyles and future food and nutrition security depend on the full participation of the young people. It recognized the positive impact the youth have in ensuring that SDG2 (Zero Hunger) is achieved sooner than later.

Speaking during the event, CAS Namwamba in support of the theme, encouraged more youth to engage in the transformation of food systems to promote food and nutrition security within sustainable healthy ecosystems.

"The youth must make use of increased access to information to develop the culture of sustainable, healthy, economically viable agriculture that promotes environmental protection and resilient food system," CAS Namwamba said.





He added that, "mental health is key, as you take care of your body, take care of your mind. A perfect mix of healthy people and a healthy environment is necessary for productive population. This must go hand in hand with healthy feeding habits in terms of quality and quantity.

The CAS pointed out that Kenya obtained special recognition for her consistent commitment to the youth agenda during the 73rd United Nations General Assembly (2018) when H.E. President was unanimously endorsed as the global champion of the young people's Agenda.

Highlighting Governments' contribution to promotion of Youth Agenda, CAS Namwamba noted the numerous initiatives to enhance access to finance, which include, the Uwezo Fund, Women Enterprise Fund and the Youth Enterprise Development Fund. All intended to tap into the creative abilities of the youth to generate opportunities for employment and wealth creation.

H.E. Amb. Saripudin, reiterated ASEANs commitment to further strengthen its bilateral cooperation with Kenya.



MFA Learning Series



MFA virtue learning Series Discussion Forum

The Ministry of Foreign Affairs through the Foreign Service Academy has launched the 'Learning Series' Discussion Forum aimed at availing an avenue to share experimental knowledge and re-learn in order to design better methodologies in achieving set targets and advance Kenya's Foreign Policy.

The lecture series are an initiative of the Cabinet Secretary Amb. Raychelle Omamo and are an integral programme under the Academy's outreach and knowledge management function.

Speaking during the inaugural learning session held virtually on August 10, 2021 under the topic "The Covid-19 Pandemic: Critical Lessons for Diplomatic Engagement and Response" CS Omamo highlighted that the forum provided a practical way through which the Ministry can learn of the various innovations adopted across the 56 missions abroad to cope with the new practice of diplomacy in the midst of Covid-19.

The CS noted that the Covid-19 pandemic had altered the traditional ways of doing business, spun work routines and reconfigured the performance target deliver methods. She therefore highlighted that the forum has the potential to promote new effective approaches in times of uncertainties and aid in seeking readjustment in the realization of targets.

Learning and re-learning should be an aspect of our everyday life. Therefore, this is a great opportunity for all of us to learn from different experiences so as to enrich our collective knowledge on how to go about seeking answers to issues while enhancing skills and expertise for navigating the dynamics of diplomacy.

The format for the online series will comprise two-hour discussions forums held virtually once every quarter. Other topics earmarked for discussion include; - Kenya and the United Nations Security Council and the African Union Peace and Security Council and promoting trade and investment- critical lessons learned from bilateral and multilateral economic engagments.

Tanzanian Minister of Foreign Affairs and East African Cooperation, H.E Amb. Liberata Mulamula at the invitation by her Kenyan Counterpart Cabinet Secretary Amb. Raychelle Omamo during her official visit to Kenya, held discussions with young female officers from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs on the August 23, 2021. This session was part of the Azizi Dialogue mentorship program initiative launched by the Amb. Raychelle Omamo, Cabinet Secretary of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in 2020.

The Azizi Dialogues Mentorship Program gives young officers a platform to have conversations with vastly experienced professionals in the diplomatic field. In her opening speech, CS Omamo welcomed H.E Amb. Liberata Mulamula as the Chief Mentor of the session. She went on to explain the meaning of 'Azizi' as the Arabic word for 'precious' and gave a brief history of the Mentorship program.

Speaking during the mentorship dialogue, H.E Amb. Mulamula highlighted her leadership journey as a career foreign service officer. She encouraged the young officers to step into their truth and use their voice to inspire, be determined, dedicated and disciplined as they build their career through hard work, good conduct, respect and perseverance. "Every time don't go for normal, thrive for extraordinary," she stressed.

H.E Amb. Mulamula shared her inspiring career journey from Third Secretary to becoming the Minister for Foreign Affairs and East African Cooperation in the United Republic of Tanzania. Her journey, she said is one filled with ups and downs.



Building her career as a young officer, it took 25 years to become an ambassador. She joined the service in 1980 and was only posted five years later to the United Nations Permanent Mission in New York which was a defining moment for her as a young diplomat.

It was a great training ground as she learned the courage to speak her truth. She learned to be herself, to be authentic and to not let others impose on her as a woman. She urged the young officers to strive for the same.

Amb. Mulamula was also the first female Director of Multilateral Cooperation at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and East African Cooperation in the United Republic of Tanzania. She has served as the first female Executive Secretary of International Conference on the Great Lakes Region (ICGLR) and is the first career ambassador to be posted to Washington DC.

Amb. Mulamula was the first female Permanent Secretary of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in the United Republic of Tanzania. She is a member of the UN Secretary General's Advisory Group on Peace Building Fund and a founding member of Femiwise-Africa – the Network of African Women in Conflict Prevention and Meditation, and African Women Leaders Network (AWLN), among others.

"True character and success is defined not when everything is going your way but rather how you react when it's not." The Ministers advised the young officers to be resilient and to grow a "thick skin" in their respective journeys. She urged them to strive for inclusiveness and participation especially in matters affecting women.

She concluded her talk with a quote from Robin Sharma's book, "The Greatness guide" that says, 'Real leadership is not about prestige, power, status, title. It is about responsibility.'

Kenya welcomes the Reconstitution of the Transitional National Legislative Assembly of South Sudan and the swearing in of the 588 Legislators and 84 members of the Council of States on August 2021.

The CS urged all parties concerned to find amicable solutions to their concerns and retaliated Kenya's commitment to assisting South Sudan achieve lasting peace.
