This time of the year is always a busy time as world leaders converge at the United General Assembly complex in New York to deliberate on various issues. Kenya is optimistic that the deliberations will chart a way forward for the future of diplomacy post-COVID 19.

Kenya's participation at 76th Session of the United Nations General Assembly focused on the key issues, which dovetails with Kenya's Big 4 Agenda - Energy Matters; Food Systems Agenda; Climate Change Issues; Global Governance and Oceans Agenda Progress made towards the Sustainable Development Goals; Regional Peace and Security.

His Excellency the President, has, on several occasions, called for strengthened global governance that is cognizant of the global fragilities being witnessed, owing not just to the COVID-19 pandemic, but also due to the environmental issues being exacerbated by climate change.

In regards to climate change, Kenya has been one of the countries taking a leadership role in addressing this challenge. The call for action on climate change requires States to make ambitious commitments. I am pleased that Kenya has increased her Nationally Determined Contributions from 30% to 32%. I am further convinced that global support in terms of climate financing is paramount for Kenya to achieve her targets by the year 2025.

Kenya just concluded hosting the Africa Green Revolution Forum, a global Summit that brought together world leaders to chart a way forward towards a sustainable food system. Kenya has been at the forefront of advocating transformative agriculture, which fits appropriately with the High Level Event on United Nations Food Systems Summit.

Additionally, Kenya has also been at the fore front in championing clean energy. Energy can and will continue to play a central role in countries' efforts to recover from the COVID-19 crisis in ways that make them better, stronger and more resilient. Kenya has played her role as a Global Theme Champion on Energy Access, with a specific focus on clean cooking.

It will be recalled that for the past 9 months, Kenya has dutifully and dependably continued to execute continental and regional mandates at the United Nations Security Council, following the African Union's resounding endorsement and Kenya's subsequent election to the Council. It is also worth pointing out that Kenya's membership to the UNSC is coinciding with the country's concurrent membership in the African Union Peace and Security Council (AUPSC) for the period of 2019-2022.

Both the UN Security Council and the AU's Peace and Security Council are critical infrastructures for the maintenance and furtherance of International Peace and Security. In addition to Kenya's Presidency of the Organization of the African, Caribbean and Pacific States (OACPS), membership in these global security institutions only serves to illustrate Kenya's expanding influence on the international stage. This also aptly dovetails with our philosophy and belief as a country that global challenges are only surmountable if the world's rules-based multilateral system is deployed in a manner that attracts consensus. This is only just in the appreciation of the challenges, but also in evolution of practical strategies.

It is against this background that Kenya will be presiding over the affairs of the UN Security Council as the President for the month of October, 2021. Admittedly, our Presidency of the UN Security Council will be taking place at a critical juncture in the international arena. Unlike the 1997-1998 term when Kenya last served at the Council,

the nature and character of diplomatic actors has changed considerably. An increasingly globalizing and interconnecting world, coupled with advancements in Information, Communication and Technology (ICT) and increased migration, among other factors, have birthed emerging security challenges such as terrorism and cybercrime.

In addition, the ongoing global COVID-19 pandemic and its attendant disruptions, as well as increasingly divergent philosophical and political approaches to issues of global interests, particularly among the leading powers, call for skillful engagements to build bridges and galvanize consensus towards sustainable global peace.

I remain convinced though that Kenya's experiences, ethos and philosophy will stand the country in good stead in pursuing mutually beneficial outcomes during our Presidency of the Council in October and even throughout our term at the Security Council. In particular, Kenya will continue to advance good neighbourliness and Pan Africanist ideals on the basis of our four broad priority objectives: Regional Peace and Security; Peace Support Operations; Counter Terrorism and Violent Extremism; and Climate and Security.

This is actually reflected in the choice and range of the high-level signature events that Kenya will anchor our Presidency in the month of October, 2021 as follows;

On October 12th, 2021, His Excellency President Hon. Uhuru Kenyatta will convene an in-person Heads of State and Government Level Open Debate on Peacebuilding and Sustainable Peace, with the theme of "Identity, State Building and the Search for Peace."

In convening this High-Level Open Debate, Kenya will be inviting the Security Council to consider how the combination of information revolution, globalization, urbanization, inequality, environmental stress and demography have arguably made identity the core determinant of conflicts. These conflicts are underpinned by group-based grievances, which often fan deepseated feelings of injustice and unfairness.

This implies that a core imperative for effective peace and state building is to successfully mediate important group dynamics and differences centred around such factors as colour, ethnicity, religion, history, social status among others, to reinforce the sense of broadly shared nationhood and belonging.

I need to underscore that this high-level debate will provide a unique opportunity for deeper consideration of state building and identity, and how they interact in the search for peace, with delegation encouraged to consider sharing their national experiences in the mediation of group grievance.

The Second-High Level Event will also be a Heads of State and Government High Level debate, which will be convened virtually by His Excellency President Hon. Uhuru KENYATTA, C.G.H on October 28th, 2021. This will be on the Cooperation between the UN and the Regional and sub-regional Organizations, with specific reference to the African Union.

The theme for this High-Level Debate, is "Leveraging the African Union Peace and Security Architecture (APSA) and subregional mechanisms for the continent's peace, security and prosperity", which speaks to seeking practical and innovative ways of strengthening partnership between the UN and the AU, while highlighting the important role of Regional Economic Communities (RECs) and Regional Mechanisms (RMs).

In convening this High-Level debate, Kenya remains persuaded that the maintenance of international peace and security is a collective responsibility based on strong partnerships and shared responsibility. Therefore, collaboration and productive burden sharing is the practical and pragmatic approach of sustainably addressing contemporary threats.

Indeed, central to Africa's relationship with the rest of the world is the pursuit of African solutions to the challenges of peace and security by prioritizing regional and sub-regional organizations' leadership, as well as meaningful engagements through strengthened partnership and shared responsibility.

In advocating for African peace promoted and maintained by Africans themselves, the High-Level Open Debate will seek to bring together H.E António Guterres, UN Secretary-General and H.E. Moussa Faki, the AU Commission Chairperson, as well as the sitting chairpersons of the AU and subregional organizations in Africa to participate and to share the perspectives of their respective sub-regions.

The third High Level event will be an inperson Ministerial level which will be an Open briefing on the Great Lakes Region, convened under the theme, "Supporting the renewed commitment of the Great Lakes countries in seeking sustainable solutions to the root causes and drivers of conflict". This is scheduled for October 20, 2021 and I am looking forward to convening this meeting at the UN Security Council Chambers in New York.

It may be stressed that countries of the Great Lakes Region (GLR) continue to be afflicted by many security challenges. However, in recent years, countries in the GLR have made commendable progress in addressing the root causes and drivers of conflict.

The peaceful transfers of power in the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC) and Burundi, as well as the signing and implementation of peace agreements in the Central Africa Republic (CAR) and in South Sudan, illustrate the positive momentum. More recent developments include the normalising of bilateral relations between the brotherly countries of DRC, Rwanda, Uganda and Burundi.

Meanwhile these countries, with the assistance of the international community, are keen on implementing the United Nations Strategy for Peace Consolidation, Conflict prevention and Conflict resolution in the Great Lakes Region, which the Special Envoy of the Secretary General to the region will report to the Security Council during the October briefing.

The High-Level Ministerial briefing of October 20th, 2021 under my leadership will, therefore, provide an opportunity for the Security Council to renew its commitment to the region, and to support the implementation of the priority projects aimed at interalia: Promoting a shared vision of regional peace, security and socio-economic development and strengthening cooperation in addressing the drivers of conflict and instability with a specific focus on transforming the productive use of natural resources.

Similarly, I will be chairing a Ministerial Level Open debate on Women and Peace and Security, under the theme of "Investing in women peacekeepers and women peacebuilders", on October 21st, 2021. This will be the fourth High Level event under Kenya's Presidency of the Council in October of this year.

It will be recalled that the 2020 Report on Women and Peace and Security, the Secretary-General proposed goals for the decade ahead, which include a call for "A radical shift in the meaningful participation of women in our peace-making, peacekeeping and peacebuilding efforts, ensuring that women are fully involved as equal partners in peace and from the earliest stages in each and every peace and political process that the United Nations supports."

This Ministerial Open Debate, therefore, will be another opportunity to share insights on progress, trends and challenges, as well as best practices and lessons learnt with a view to make recommendations for investing in women peacekeepers, women peacebuilders, and their networks to accelerate the implementation of the women, peace and security (WPS) agenda and to ensure sustainable peace outcomes during and post- peace operation and mission transition settings.

It will also serve to recognize and showcase local women's contribution and influence in all stages of peacekeeping, peace-making and peacebuilding. To this end, the debate will be preceded by the official launch in conjunction with the UN Department of Peace Operations (DPO) of the Photoville travelling exhibition to several African mission settings dubbed "In Their Hands: Women Taking Ownership for Peace". The literature for this exhibition which will be made available after this briefing - is in recognition that women across the globe are actively preventing conflict, pushing for peaceful transitions from conflict and building peace as peacekeepers. peacebuilders. mediators, decision-makers, change makers and activists.

Kenya is assuming the Presidency of the Council at a crucial juncture, not just for our region, but also for the larger international community. The scale and breath of our agenda for the Presidency of the Council and indeed during our tenure of the Council – is a testimony to this fact.

Even as we look forward to presiding over the Security Council affairs in October, the state of affairs in today's world brings to mind an observation made by the great son of Kenya, the late Professor Ali MAZRUI. The late Prof. Mazrui remarked that there exists a tension between the need for global order versus the need to achieve justice in the world community.

Indeed, the ongoing global pandemic of the corona virus has served to highlight the fragmentation within our societies, revealed and compounded existing inequalities, as well as unevenness of power in global governance. This has also been compounded by skewed vaccine access and inequalities, climate change, challenges associated unmitigated urbanization and challenges associated with reluctance to offer debt relief to the most affected countries. All these ultimately contribute and translates into social and economic inequality in the face of the current pandemic.

Kenya looks forward to vibrant engagement and positive outcomes during the October UNSC Presidency.



Estonia's President, Kersti Kaljulaid makes historic visit to Kenya

Her Excellency Kersti Kaljulaid, President of the Republic of Estonia made a four-day's State Visit to Kenya from September 8 to 11, 2021 on invitation by Kenya's President, His Excellency Uhuru Kenyatta.

On arrival at Jomo Kenyatta International Airport, President Kaljulaid was received by Cabinet Secretaries Amb. Raychelle Omamo (Foreign Affairs) and Amb. Monica Juma (Defence), who was her Escort of Honour.

During her visit, Her Excellency Kaljulaid held high level consultations with her host His Excellency Uhuru Kenyatta at State House Nairobi. The two leaders discussed several matters of mutual interest to Kenya and Estonia.

President Kenyatta, applauded President Kaljulaid for being the first female president of Estonia and congratulated her on being appointed the United Nations Global Advocate for 'Every Woman and Every Child' and expressed appreciation for choosing Kenya for her maiden visit to the continent.

The two heads of State reiterated their commitment to continue strengthening bilateral cooperation in various sectors such as ICT, Trade and Investment; digital transformation and environment. To further strengthen the existing bilateral cooperation, the two leaders witnessed the signing of bilateral framework of cooperation on political consultations, health as well as a letter of intent in the area of environment.

Kenya and Estonia signed a bilateral framework of cooperation on Political Consultations, Health and Environment.

On the issue of Covid-19, they were in agreement that the devastating effects of the pandemic require immediate and effective action by the international community as a whole. They agreed on the need for universal access to vaccines to ensure vaccines for all and embraced multilateralism as the most appropriate path for economic and social recovery in times of the pandemic.

On peace and security, they committed to work closely as Non-Permanent Members of the United Nations Security Council with a view to contribute to peace and security, respect for democracy and human rights, gender equality and women empowerment.

The two leaders, reiterated their commitment to the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals the 2030 Agenda and the 2063 Agenda of the African Union as the way to build sustainable, just, inclusive and resilient economies

During her visit, President Kersti Kaljulaid addressed the Kenya-Estonia Business Forum focusing on ICT and e-solution to sustainable development in education, health, energy, petroleum and mining.

At a separate event and accompanied by Kenya marathoners (Douglas Wakiihuri, Tegla Loroupe and Catherine Ndereba), President Kaljulaid participated in a 10k marathon at Karura Forest. The race was flagged off by Sports Cabinet Secretary Amb. Amina Mohammed.

At the tail end of her successful official visit to Kenya, she visited Michuki Park for a tree planting exercise, the Elephant Sanctuary in Karen and the Kenya Red Cross offices.



Kenya makes history by hosting the inaugural Africa – Caribbean Community Summit



First Africa Caricom Summit hosted by H.E President Uhuru Kenyatta under the theme 'Unity Across Continents and Oceans: Opportunities for Deepening Integration on September 7, 2021

History was made on September 7, 2021, when Kenya hosted the first ever African – Caribbean Community (CARICOM) Summit themed "Unity Across Continents and Oceans: Opportunities for Deepening Integration."

The summit held virtually was an initiative by Kenya and was chaired by His Excellency President Uhuru Kenyatta. The meeting brought together African and Caribbean Heads of States and Government to discuss the deepening of cooperation and leveraging on opportunities for development and shared prosperity.

The objective of the historic summit was to reaffirm the bonds of ancestry and friendship between Africa and CARICOM and build a foundation for lasting, robust socio-economic and political engagements as well as partnerships between the two regions for a collective prosperous future.

Speaking at the event, President Uhuru Kenyatta advocated for the forging of closer working partnerships between African and the Caribbean nations so as to raise their power of overcoming common challenges such as Covid-19, climate change and public debt.

The President Kenyatta urged leaders of the two regions to deepen the existing historical and cultural ties that

bind their nations so as to build strong socio-economic and political linkages that will promote shared prosperity and social progress.

He challenged the leaders to exploit the opportunities presented by historical relationships to achieve aspirations of African and the Caribbean states through enhanced economic, social and cultural cooperation.

"Our common historical experiences of slavery and colonialism inspired Africa's founding fathers to form the Pan-African Movement in the early 1900's. This movement was championed by Africans in the diaspora, which established the foundations of a rich and vibrant African-Caribbean relationship," President Kenyatta said.

The Head of State outlined five key areas of cooperation namely; the blue economy, climate change, health and Covid-19, debt sustainability and technology which he said are crucial as the two regions initiate working partnerships.

The Summit expressed concerned on the rapid mutation and spread of the Covid-19 pandemic and deleterious economic and social impact it has had on societies, health and infrastructure. They called for increased access to vaccines,

production of vaccines in the African continent and within the Caribbean and for the waiver of specific articles of the TRIPS agreements by the World Trade Organization Member States on the Intellectual Property Rights protection for technologies needed to prevent and contain Covid-19.

Heads of State and Government of the African Union and the Caribbean Community Member States, as well as Chair of the African Union Commission. Chairs Africa of Regional Economic Communities (RECs), CARICOM Troika. CARICOM Secretariat, the Secretary General of the Organization of the African Caribbean and Pacific States (OACPS), and the President of Caribbean Development Bank attended the virtual meeting.

The historic meeting was held nearly Five hundred years after the commencement of the displacement of enslaved Africans to the Caribbean and Seventy-six years after the seminal 5th Pan-African Congress that was held in Manchester, England in 1945, and that brought together the political activists of Africa and the Caribbean to conceive plans to bring about the decolonization of these two regions.

The Summit also took place Fifty-eight years since the 1963 establishment of the Organization of African Unity (OAU), Fifty-three years after the founding of Caribbean Free Trade Organization (CARIFTA) and Forty-eight years after the establishment of CARICOM.



President Kenyatta calls on African leaders to prioritize agricultural transformation

Kenya hosted the Eleventh Africa Green Revolution Forum (AGRF) Summit under the leadership of His Excellency President Uhuru Kenyatta on September 7 to 10, 2021 in Nairobi. The global Summit brought together world leaders to chart a way forward towards a sustainable food system. Kenya has been at the forefront of advocating transformative agriculture.

The Summit held under the banner "Pathways to recovery and resilient food systems," aimed to elevate the single coordinated African voice to the United Nations Food System Summit (UNFSS) and to identify immediate actions and steps needed to accelerate progress and recovery towards inclusive agricultural transformation.

Speaking when he hosted this year's virtual AGRF Summit at State House, President Uhuru Kenyatta rallied African nations to accelerate efforts aimed at attaining greater food security on the content and called on African leaders to prioritize initiatives that will cause inclusive agricultural transformation.

The President emphasized that Kenya was committed to the agenda of transforming its food systems by reengineering the country's agriculture to leverage more on its large and vibrant youth populations.

President Kenyatta outlined the actions taken by Kenya to boost the country's food security within the Big Four economic blueprint, saying since 2013, Kenya had focused on attaining 100 percent food and nutrition security through crop diversification, e-voucher programmes that support staple crops, livestock and dairy value chains, growing of indigenous food crops and vegetables, developing seed systems for sorghum, millet and cassava as well as establishing flour blending and fortification policies.

Guided by the Africa Common Position Document and the UN Food System Summit areas of action, areas of urgent priority, African countries committed to: catalyze rapid expansion in agriculture and food productivity, with a particular focus on smallholder farmers and women; boost investment financing for Africa's food systems; ensure access to safe and nutritious food for all; strengthen Africa's local and regional food markets; Build resilience especially through social safety nets, and early warning systems.

Major commitments were reached in areas of nutrition, innovation, renewable energy, climate change, regional food trade, and investment towards the transformation of food systems. Participants committed to resilient value chain development for farm input. The summit honoured women and youth entrepreneurs for their leadership and achievement on the pathway to inclusive business development and advocacy.

Recognizing the urgency of addressing challenges and raising ambition to meet the demands of this and future generations to end hunger, the AGRF called upon leaders, institutions, investors, coalitions, and individuals to accelerate action towards the 2030 SDGs, and unlock change for people, prosperity and planet by building resilient food systems.

The five-day event held both virtually and physically attracted 8300 participants bringing together global and African stakeholders in the agricultural sector.

Speakers at the virtual meeting, among them Presidents Paul Kagame (Rwanda), Yoweri Museveni (Uganda), Lazarus Chakwera (Malawi), Hage Geingob (Namibia), and UN Deputy Secretary General Amina Mohammed as well as Kenya's former Prime Minister Raila Odinga, decried Africa's weak food systems despite the continent's abundant nutritional resources endowment.

The AGRF is an annual Summit that aims at bringing together global and African stakeholders in the agricultural sector to come up with practical solutions and share lessons that will help develop Africa's Agricultural systems. The forum was established by YARA in Norway in 2006 and later moved to Africa in 2010.

To facilitate the Summit, the Ministry of Agriculture, Livestock, Fisheries and Co-operatives constituted a Multi-Agency Local Organising Committee (LOC) comprising of various Government Ministries and non-governmental organizations.

Chief Administration Secretary, Hon. Ababu Namwamba made an official visit to the Republic of Slovenia to attend and participate at the 16th Bled Strategic Forum titled "*The Future of Europe*" held from August 31 to September 2, 2021 in Bled, Slovenia.

The Forum gave Kenya a unique opportunity to share its position, particularly as a Non-Permanent Member of the United Nations Council and to seek support towards Kenya's priorities in the European union, notably support for AMISOM post-December 2021, designation of Kenya as a manufacturing hub for vaccines and conclusion of the proposed Kenya- EU Strategic Dialogue.

Speaking as a panelist during the Forum on the topic 'Partnership for a Rules-based Order in the Indo-Pacific,' Hon. Namwamba reaffirmed Kenya's geostrategic position as the Indo-Pacific gateway to Africa, isolated latent threats, and urged win-win partnership models that spur trade, investment and shared prosperity.

Hon. Namwamba emphasized the fact that the region has many opportunities for countries in the Indo-Pacific and the recent Regional Comprehensive Economic Partnership is a platform that presents real opportunities for engagements and shared prosperity.

He further pointed out the heterogeneous nature of the Indo-Pacific and described it as a "melting pot of people, cultures, interests and could be looked at geographically as the Eastern, Central and the Western Indo-Pacific where Kenya falls.

"Kenya is a believer in multilateralism and believes in partnerships. The EU- India Partnership is significant and a gateway for further future engagements in Africa and the Western Indo- Pacific, particularly in the Horn of Africa," CAS Namwamba highlighted.

Others panelists' included India's External Affairs Minister Dr. Subrahmanyam Jaishankar, Slovenia Foreign Minister Dr. Anze Logar and Portuguese Foreign Minister Dr. Augusto Santos Silva.

The 16th edition of the Bled Strategic Forum hosted more than 170 panelists' and speakers from all over the world including EU high representatives, heads of state and government, foreign ministers, representatives of think tanks, civil society, research and academic sphere.

On the sidelines of Forum, Hon. Ababu Namwamba held bilateral talks with Slovenian State Secretary for Foreign Affairs and Acting Minister for Development Cooperation Dr. Stanislav Raščan at the Foreign Office in Ljubljana. They discussed bilateral cooperation in trade, investment, tourism, and multilateralism.

Hon. Namwamba emphasized that the visit would open opportunities to deepen relations between the two countries. He extended an invitation to the Slovenian Foreign Minister Dr. Anze Logar on behalf of the Cabinet Secretary Amb. Raychelle Omamo.

The CAS drew the State Secretary's attention to the absence of an Embassy in Nairobi stating that it would facilitate enhanced engagement and collaboration between the two countries.

"This would be a great foundation to bolster bilateral cooperation," CAS Ababu said, adding that Kenya desires to bolster the low bilateral trade figures.

He lauded the Joint Health Care Assistance project worth Ksh.21 million that the governments of Slovenia and Hungary have implemented in Kenya with the aim of deepening and expanding productive relations.

Uganda's Foreign Affairs Principal Secretary, Mr. Vincent Waisawa Bagiire made an official visit to Kenya on September 2, 2021 at the invitation by his Kenyan counterpart Amb. Macharia Kamau. The visit aimed at taking stock of the bilateral relations between the two friendly nations and chart ways of strengthening and deepening the relations.

During bilateral talks between the two principals, PS Kamau lauded the historical bonds of friendship between Kenya and Uganda noting the shared values and aspirations in various sectors including - political, social-economic, cultural and diplomatic exchanges.

Both principal secretaries appreciated the strong relations and shared matters of mutual interest at regional, continental and multilateral level and the cooperation in areas of transport, trade and investment fight against terrorism, immigration and security.

On trade and investment, the two leaders took note of the persistent Non-Tarrif Barriers and Technical Barriers to Trade that continue to frustrate trade and investment in the two countries. They agreed to work towards improving the trade relations in order to guarantee the socio-economic development of the people of the two nations.

"Amb. Kamau commended Uganda for the leading role it continues to play in the maintenance of peace and stability in the region and underscored that it is imperative that the two nations work together in fighting the menace of extremism and terrorism.

He highlighted that, Kenya as a Non-Permanent Member of the UN Security Council seeks to work closely with Uganda in addressing some of the problems affecting the Horn of Africa. He called for closer working relations between their respective missions in New York.

Let's Talk About Mental Health in The Workplace

The topic of mental health in the workplace is one that is being discussed more and more. It's no longer something that employers or employees can ignore. However, the subject is often shrouded in confusion, myths, and stigma. Every day we come to work, get busy with our tasks, and go home at the end of the day. Work is good for mental health, but a negative working environment can lead to physical and mental health problems.

A recent study by the American Psychological Association found that the number of Americans who experienced a mental health issue in the last year has increased by a staggering 18 percent in the last 5 years.

The Covid-19 pandemic has heightened the slew of negative emotions among employees' lives such as stress, anxiety, depression, and a lot of times grief. The stress of working during the pandemic has been magnified by the loss of loved ones due to Covid-19.

An individual's poor mental health affects their job performance and productivity, communication with coworkers, physical capability and daily functioning and their engagement with their work. It is important for both the employer and employees to work towards the mental well-being of the employees.

Not all mental health issues are obvious, and sometimes it is not easy to tell the difference between a mental illness and a temporary mood. If you think you are struggling with mental health issues, know that you are not alone. There are many people who are working with their mental health every single day. And there are many resources available to help you tackle your mental health head on.

Watch out for warning signs such as dramatic sleep or appetite changes, rapid mood changes, withdrawal, drop in functioning, increased sensitivity, apathy, feeling disconnected, illogical or irrational thinking, nervousness and any other unusual behavior which could indicate mental health concern in you or a coworker.

There are different ways of coping with mental health issues, both healthy and maladaptive. I'd advise that you go for the healthy coping mechanisms for the obvious reasons that the maladaptive ways such as drinking, and gambling will in the long be destructive towards your health, relationships and work.

Here are a few healthy mechanisms for the most common workplace mental health concerns:

Coping with Stress: Some of the healthy coping mechanism to practice when coping with stress include emphasizing work-life balance, exercising regularly, eating well, making time for hobbies, connecting with a support system, meditating, or practicing yoga, getting enough sleep, spending time with a pet/loved one.

Coping with anxiety: When experiencing anxiety attack, one can do the following to ease the anxiety attack; Practice focused deep breathing, aromatherapy, take a walk, meditate, practice yoga or exercise, write down thoughts and identify triggers so you can resolve them.

Coping with depression: When going through depression, try and stay connected with others, prioritize face-time (even virtually), try pet therapy, do things you enjoy (or used to), try to get enough sleep, exercise, don't skip meals, take a walk in the sunlight, challenge negative thoughts, read a good book/watch a funny movie.

Coping with Grief: Grief can be a crippling feeling and most of the time we don't feel like other people understand what we are going through. Many of us have lost loved ones during this Pandemic. It is therefore necessary to equip ourselves with coping mechanisms when experiencing grief. You can lean on friends and family, accept and face your feelings, express feelings creatively (writing, drawing, etc.), try to maintain hobbies/interests, preserve memories (photo album, memorial, etc.) or even join a support group.

Mental health is and will always remain a sore and sensitive topic for most people. A positive mental health is great for individual's physical health and performance in the workplace. Nairobi Metropolitan Services has announced a list of 32 health facilities where one can get psychological services. Don't be afraid to seek help if experiencing any mental health issue. The hardest step is reaching out and admitting that you need help.
